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SEARCH: EXPANDING OUR REACH TO KENNEBEC AND SOMERSET COUNTIES

According to the 2018 U.S. Census Bureau's report, 20.6% of Maine's population is age 65 or older, the highest share of any state in the nation. That's no news to us here at Catholic Charities Maine and our SEARCH (Seek Elderly Alone, Renew Courage & Hope) program, which currently provides companionship, transportation, and other services to isolated seniors in eight counties.

But we knew the need was greater, so early in 2019, we applied for and won a Corporation for National and Community Service RSVP (Senior Corps) grant for Somerset and Kennebec Counties in the amount of \$100,000. With this money, we started a new SEARCH site in Somerset. The grant was increased this fall with another \$7,500 in federal RSVP funding, for a total of \$107,500 a year for three years.

With approximately 250-275 volunteers currently enrolled in the program in total, SEARCH hopes to add around 50 more volunteers in both Somerset and Kennebec counties. Another grant awarded by the Maine Community Foundation allowed SEARCH to begin expanding into Oxford County in 2019 as well.

"These grants will really help to sustain our outreach to isolated seniors," says SEARCH Director Wendy Russell.

But covering half the counties in our state isn't enough! By 2021, we hope to add two more counties to our service area, and we won't stop until every isolated senior in Maine has the opportunity to connect with a caring companion.

REFUGEE & IMMIGRATION SERVICES:

EXPANDING OUR SERVICES IN RESPONSE TO COMMUNITY NEEDS

When changes in federal policy drastically reduced the number of refugees being resettled in Maine, our Refugee & Immigration Services Program transformed their model of operations to meet evolving needs within communities for different services.

Catholic Charities Maine resettled 140 refugees in 2019 - a number that has remained flat in recent years and represents an 82% drop from the program's peak in 2016.

For Catholic Charities Maine, this meant adapting to meet the needs of a new group — those seeking asylum. In addition to cultural trainings, we offered interpreter services to cities, businesses, school systems, hospitals, churches, host families, and other nonprofits working to address the needs of the newcomers.

These changes in the type of work and services we offered also meant changes in funding sources, relying less on federal money for resettlement and focusing on our ability to retool, repackage, and redeliver our skills in a way that better met the needs of private-sector organizations and municipalities.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES:

MEETING THE NEED WHERE IT'S GREATEST

Nowhere within Catholic Charities Maine is transformation more striking than our Behavioral Health Network of services. That's because the clients we see today often have complex and multi-faceted diagnoses.

Early in 2019, we began the true integration of our offerings around adult and children's mental health, functional family therapy, counseling services, and substance use disorder services. And as 2019 drew to a close, we firmed up plans for a new location for our southern regional behavioral health network, while continuing our commitment to bring comprehensive care in the northern and central regions with offices in Auburn, Augusta, Bangor and Fairfield.

While real estate prices in Portland could have forced us into space well outside the city limits, the sale of an older building that required costly upkeep and the coordination of complementary services under one roof allowed us to secure a new location in the heart of Portland. From our new location, we can offer comprehensive, coordinated behavioral health care on the peninsula while remaining convenient for our clients and the vulnerable populations we serve.

"Most of our clients need both mental health services and substance use disorder treatment," says Kelly Butler, Director of Support & Recovery Services. "The best option for our clients is to provide the help they need in a location they can easily get to."


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
