This juicy fact became their secret weapon, proving lollipops weren't just yummy; they were a symbol of Connecticut's innovative spirit. Third graders from Dwight Elementary School in Fairfield took the initiative and lobbied the Connecticut General Assembly to adopt the lollipop as

Putting Your Garden to Bed Thursday, October 10th at 6:30


UConn Master Gardener Vicki DeLeo will present a timely and informative program on what steps should be taken to close down your garden for the winter, so that it

will be ready for the Spring season. With winter on its way, this is the perfect time to prepare your gardens for the stresses of the coming winter.







CT's New Wheelchair Law, PA 24-58

Connecticut has a new law concerning 'Wheelchair Repairs.' This law requires wheelchair suppliers to respond promptly and requires the suppliers to order any needed parts within three business days. The suppliers are also required to have the wheelchair repaired within ten business days of the original call seeking repair. The wheelchair owner has the right to have the repair done at home or in a shop and

advance authorizations are prohibited. A fact sheet is attached which details the steps a concerned person would need to take. This sheet has detailed information for 'What You Need to Know', 'What You Need to Do', 'Report Delays' and 'Contact Information'. This new law should help people maneuver through the process of repairing equipment in a timely manner.
