It was there—literally living alongside residents, always helping—that Lon first cared for Maine's seniors and witnessed the important role residential care and senior living communities have in the lives of Maine families.

For Managing Member and Chief Operating Officer Matthew Walters, striving to provide exceptional care for Maine seniors is an inherent family value. Like his father, Lon Walters, Matthew understood from a young age how intrinsically valuable the role of senior living communities is for residents, their families and the community as a whole.

Sexual abuse continues to be of interest to Susan, but it is the extreme poverty she became aware of that has caught her attention the most. "I have a real respect for the work health and social service personnel do in this community every day."

I asked why she continued to commute to and invest in Farmington as she spends so much time in Southern Maine. "It is a forgiving community, people are so, well, human. I can relate to my customers here and it's REAL and genuine. I feel like I can make more of a difference here."

Susan joined the new Corporate Champion Circle at the Gold level and she felt like it was a way to support the United Way in what it is trying to accomplish. "I believed in the plan they put together and collaborating on marketing opportunities is valuable. The more we can work together and support each other in this community, the better."
