Classroom News--UMF pre-service teachers recently taught a garden lesson to our 3rd grade students. Sarah Reynolds worked with Franklin County teachers and Laura Hoeft, our school garden coach, to develop the Growing Gardeners curriculum. Sarah presented the curriculum to the UMF pre-service teachers, who were then tasked with bringing a lesson to life in our 3rd grade classrooms. CBS students got to learn about the parts of a plant through hands-on activities with fruits and vegetables. This tied in perfectly with the garden lessons our students participated in this fall!

This guest speaker wrapped up a unit on food webs and ecosystems.

Nick Rimsa, from The Good Crust, came to speak to Mrs. Davis's fifth grade class about local grains. He taught us about where the grains come from, the differences between whole grains, and why our bodies need them. We were then able to use the whole grains in a pizza crust. We then baked our pizzas and a yummy time was had by all. Another big thank you to Bella Russo, from the Cooperative Extension Office, for providing us with weekly nutrition lessons. She enabled us to learn even more about why it's important to think about what we are putting into our bodies.

BARR is going well. We have 4 out of 5 4th grade teachers trained. We are utilizing U-Times activities to support students with relationships and expectations. Our behavior referrals are down in fourth grade by 20% from last year.

Green Team- Students met in November.
