RSU 9 COMMUNITY FOOD PANTRY: NOURISHING BODIES AND BUILDING COMMUNITY

The RSU 9 Community Food Pantry in Farmington is a shining example of how collaboration and community spirit can make a real difference in people's lives. Focused on tackling food insecurity, the pantry offers a welcoming environment and essential services to families with children in any RSU 9 school. Led by the dedicated Kristen Wroble, a team of volunteers ensures the pantry runs smoothly and fulfills its mission.


Every month, families can pick up pre-filled bags with shelf-stable items, fresh produce, and staples for their refrigerators and freezers.







The Anita's Hope Backpack Program provides anonymous access to weekend meals and snacks for students. This program, coordinated with school nurses, ensures students have nutritious food over weekends when regular school meals aren't available. To meet this need, volunteers dedicate themselves to filling 170 backpacks twice per month, providing a total of 340 backpacks filled with weekend meals and snacks for students in need.



The RSU 9 Community Food Pantry's success hinges on collaboration. The food received from the Good Shepherd Food Bank currently comes at no cost to the Pantry, because their affiliation with RSU 9 covers the required insurance requirement and nonprofit status, which allows the food received from their partnership with the Good Shepherd Food Bank to remain free. This allows them to use donations from individuals and businesses to purchase single-serve meals & snacks (for the backpack program), and teacher/nurse snacks for our district schools. The Pantry's location in basement of the Farmington Recreation & Community Center also eliminates rent costs, meaning donations are going directly toward the purchase of food!







The tireless dedication of volunteers is the backbone of the pantry. Community members, local businesses, retired teachers, and the Tyngtown Ladies of Wilton all play crucial roles in keeping the pantry running smoothly. Adding another layer of heart to the operation, Special Education Teacher Shane Dudash brings his class from Mt. Blue High School (MBHS) to the pantry twice a month. These enthusiastic students lend a helping hand, filling backpacks and loading them onto their minibus for delivery to RSU 9 schools, along with the teacher/nurse snacks.













The pantry recognizes the importance of basic necessities as well. They offer students essential hygiene products like toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, body wash, and feminine hygiene supplies. Additionally, schools within RSU 9 receive a stock of snacks for nurses and teachers to distribute to students who might need them during the school day.
