CCHS is excited to be the recipient of a "First 10" grant. This pilot program will begin in the fall for the 2024-25 school year. The grant is intended to allow us to focus on students between the ages of 4-10, with a strong emphasis on early childhood and Pre-K learning and family involvement. We will strengthen our partnership with our Pre-K provider, Community Concepts, and build upon our inclusive programming with CDS (Child Development Services). The grant will have a coordinator position as well as a robust team of CCHS staff and community members to undertake, oversee, and provide community outreach for programming and services to benefit our students and their families. The coordinator and team members will be invited to attend a summer summit as well as attend monthly meetings to prepare for all of the activities, programming, and services we will be offering. This interactive program helps students to understand how their words or the words of others can really "weigh a person down", and offer ways to help students navigate these circumstances.



Our PTO hosted a very successful and well attended <u>"Spring Fling"</u>. Students and families enjoyed dancing and music, yummy treats, and a wonderful social time, and ended with a time to enjoy the beautiful weather out on the playground.



We have partnered with <u>"Apparel Impact"</u> as part of our community outreach through our Community Schools grant. This program works to collect clothing, shoes, and accessories which can then be redistributed to families in need throughout our own community as well as around northern New England. Every two weeks the school receives a report from AI to let us know how much we have collected as well as any requests that have been fulfilled.
