- 1. Call Meeting to Order Chair Doak
 - a. Meeting called to order at 7:02
- 2. Previous Committee Minutes-<u>8-6-2024</u> Chair Doak
 - a. Any questions?

3. Updates

- a. New Teacher Orientation Poulin
 - i. Review of days
 - 1. 2 days again this year because we had some extra funding from ESSER
 - 2. Very fortunate to have many present RSU 9 Staff participating in support of our new teachers
 - a. New staff was very involved throughout the two days
 - 3. Two well-organized days based on improvement feedback suggestions from last year

 - 1. What did our people say?
 - a. Great and varied feedback
 - i. Everyone seemed to find multiple positives about the breadth of the info shared over the two days

- b. Maine History Poulin
 - i. Wabanaki Books purchase
 - 1. Why?
 - a. Talked about the history of the law from 20 years ago and a recent updated statute expectation

- b. Assistant Super brought a group together to choose titles for a review committee to then make selections for grades K-5 as we wait for the updated social studies standards next year. We will also be asking staff to come up with plans to support in the implementation of the materials.

- c. MBHS AP & College Course Enrollment Review Joel Smith
 - i. <u>Advanced Placement</u>
 - 1. Numbers have rebounded to pre-Covid figures.
 - 2. There are several students who take college courses instead of AP.
 - 3. Bridge Academy Maine also offers college credit that is taught by our teaching staff.
 - 4. Stats, Spanish and Physics-are no longer being offered as AP courses.
 - 5. AP Lit, AP Lang, AP US, AP Euro, AP Art and AP Calculus are currently being offered.
 - 6. Offering increased programming and different classes in different ways pulls students from AP.
 - 7. We have more MBHS students taking CTE courses. AP courses could conflict with the three period CTE programming commitment.
 - 8. Maine Early College is easier to access due to a transition to a single platform noting options.
 - 9. In order to have an AP course count, a score 3 or higher is required and sometimes it is not transferable.
 - 10. Pathways have expanded, which is good for our students.

 - 1. Principal Smith reviewed numbers over time and discussed the increase of students enrolling in two year programming.

 - a. Difficult to implement the policy based on the reality in our schools.
 - b. These policies have not been reviewed in 10 + years.
 - c. A staff Survey in spring shared-Phones are a big concern and a distraction. Adjustments were emphasized this year to support staff instruction as well as student learning.
 - d. Consequences were added to the handbook.

- e. Rules for 24-25-were shared in the newsletter which drew attention to it.
- f. It is vital to work within the realities of the two perspectives.
- g. A CNN article published this morning on this topic was referenced.
- h. Middle school vs. high school-at the middle school they all use lockers which are more central to their classrooms.
- i. Policy needs to be changed to align with practice.
- j. There was some research done specific to Yonder pouches. Day Treatment uses pouches with success. Power struggle is gone with the pouches. Yonder is a significant expense.-\$25,000 for 700. There was much discussion about the implementation of the pouches. Tough balance to spend money on pouches and not on laptops.
- k. It would be an infringement on free speech to try to take away a student's phone signal.
- I. There is always a work around and some students will still be able to access all of the platforms on their iPads.
- m. Where do parents fit into the policy language?
- Policy/handbook/practice all must be aligned for successful implementation. Relying on the exception is not best practice (1b).
- o. More discussion to come up with an invitation to Joel to look at updated wording. The Superintendent and HS Principal will meet to plan next steps.

 - a. Some concerns were raised in regards to admin. disciplinary parameters
 - i. Are we giving "enough" consequences to students who are dysregulated? There is a sense that we are too lenient with how we enforce discipline with dysregulated students.
 - ii. Nine policies with any reference are noted below. All have been reviewed in the past four years. With no need for changes per Maine statute.
 - Maine changed the suspension law for fifth grade and below.
 Students can be out for up to three days max to figure out a plan for the student to return.
 - iv. Students with IEPs have more specific expectations.
 - v. There are some mitigating measures that we have added-special ed supports with new staff, Pre K expansion, K Ed Techs to help students learn SEL and regulation techniques sooner.
 - vi. How do we respond when students are not complying with our expectations, those without IEPs?
 - vii. At this time this is predominantly a K-5 issue.

- viii. We have expanded alternative education programming within RSU 9.
- ix. Specialized programming is more expensive.
